Claire is a high school senior in our home-centered education program. I, her parent and tutor, am writing this letter in lieu of a school profile. Even though Claire has certainly exceeded the number of credits required by the state of Wisconsin to graduate from high school, we will consider her high school education complete when she has met the requirements of our home school, which include continuing college courses this year through Southeastern University.

For the past several years Claire has participated in a highly academic program for homeschool students practicing dialectic and rhetorical skills. *Classical Conversations* has been a major component of her school experience. Through *Classical Conversations*, Claire has spent her junior and senior high school years studying six specific skills - grammar, logic, debate, rhetoric, exposition/composition, and research. Students use corresponding curriculum and texts and are expected to complete assignments at home. Each school year they meet once a week for thirty weeks (180 hours) in groups of 6-12 students with a trained parent tutor. The tutor guides students through a day of discussions, presentations, projects, dramatizations, policy debates, and labs emphasizing the previously mentioned skills.

The program incorporates the most appropriate aspects of AP and International Baccalaureate course work that would fit into the classical model of education. I have included summaries for the years Claire has participated in *Classical Conversations* in high school so you can see a fairly complete listing of credits and resources. Claire wrote a minimum of 750 words for each assignment and wrote at least four research papers exceeding 4000 words. She read the unabridged books listed, exceeding 50 works of literature in preparation for college and wrote over 50 essays evaluating these works. She participated in 30 physical science labs, 30 biology labs, 30 chemistry labs, and 20 Physics labs. I hope this explains Claire's unique school experience. *Classical Conversations* has allowed her to present findings, evaluate abilities, and clarify strengths and weaknesses among peers who are also highly academically motivated.

As her parents, we feel our prime time giving Claire academic instruction is complete. I will continue to guide her in her classes, but she has many plans of her own for this year. She will continue to develop and teach a burgeoning tin whistle music class, participate in Teen Pact state government opportunities, and continue her music studies with the Lawrence Academy Wind Ensemble and the Badger State Girls Choir, besides her usual community, work, and family service.

Claire is a self-directed learner, and continues to rely on her learning skills to master any subject that comes her way. I can't think of better preparation for her future studies. I believe her ACT scores and extensive resume support our confidence that she is able to excel at whatever she sets her mind to.



Special Needs Care Giver

For several hours each week over the last few years, Claire has been a care giver for her sister, who has a genetic condition (Tetrasomy 18p) resulting in severe cognitive disabilities, as well as autism. It cannot be overstated how Claire has persevered under stressful circumstances as a sibling to a sister with such significant and profound needs. Her maturity is even further demonstrated by her willingness to share her knowledge in volunteering as a counselor at camps for students with special needs, and in her compassionate approach to all who struggle with similar challenges.
